History of Temple Beth Shalom

The Hebrew Community Center had its formal beginning at a meeting in July 1947, called by Herman Rudnick, Louis Gordon, Nathan Werner, Irving Denenberg, and Myron Cohen. At the first meeting, a temporary organization was formed. Members were drawn from Florida, Chester, Warwick, and Goshen. A permanent organization, with by-laws, officers and a treasurer was developed within several months.

Hebrew and religious education for the children was the first task. The Florida Fire Department supplied a Sunday School room. Organization meetings, from the start, were held at the Florida American Legion Hall. During the first three years, High Holiday services were held in the Twin Pines home, a boarding house on the Florida/Chester Road.

By 1949 a permanent center was a definite goal. In January 1951, a New Year's Eve party was held with the ground floor 90% complete. The building was completed in early summer 1951, and was dedicated in the fall.

The women of the congregation organized soon after the general membership did, making it their special task to furnish the building. The altar and reading tables, seats, carpeting, draperies, kitchen, and much more were supplied through their work. First called the Ladies Auxiliary, they are now known as the Sisterhood of Temple Beth Shalom.

The land on which the center stands was a 100×200 foot parcel donated by David Werner. To that was added an adjacent lot 75×200 feet, donated by Samuel Chiron. The congregation itself purchased two additional lots totaling 175×100 feet, making the center property about $1\frac{1}{2}$ acres of land. In 1956 the members added a home for the Rabbi and his or her family.

In keeping with their concern for the Jewish education of the children, the Chiron – Friedman School Wing was added to the Hebrew Community Center of Florida. Work began in October 1960. The cost of the school was \$18,000. The wing was dedicated on Sunday, April 16, 1961. In this period of the early 1960's the membership added the all-important designation of Temple Beth Shalom to its name, thus emphasizing its identity as a house of worship. Land for a cemetery in Florida was acquired in 1968. Also at this time, after much deliberation, the members chose to affiliate with the Conservative Movement and joined the United Synagogues of America. This affiliation continued through 1974.

As the makeup of the membership changed, in 1974 it was decided that an affiliation with the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, the Reform Movement, would best serve the community. The official UAHC charter was presented to the congregation in 1976.

The next two decades found the temple growing in size until it became necessary, once again, to add classroom space to the building. In 1998, with a gift from the William and Viola Rosenberg family, matched by donations from the congregation, a five classroom addition with two handicapped accessible bathrooms and a ramp to the sanctuary was built. All of the interior work was done by temple members, who came together as a family to complete the task.

The Temple Beth Shalom of today offers a unique blend of Jewish culture to the Orange County community. Our congregants come to us from a variety of heritages. Although many faces have changed over the years Temple Beth Shalom is still a haimishe home for its members.

Just as the congregation takes pride in our rich temple history, it also looks ahead to a bright future.

For the Love of Temple Beth Shalom

Temple Beth Shalom stands strong 75 years after she was founded in 1947.

Seeking a community, a group of Jewish Floridians and Warwickians, led by Nathan and Deborah Werner, founded Temple Beth Shalom.

In a short period of time the community grew, property was donated, and, with vim and vigor and a lot of hands on and hard work by the community, the building they built still stands. The original building was a shell of what it is today. The sanctuary had folding chairs. One day Jerry Neustadt showed up with seating - a movie theater closed down and we now had seats; what row and seat numbers were your favorites?

For the love of TBS our foremothers and forefathers provided sweat equity and extra shekels (if they could). They believed in a Jewish community in Western Orange County; they craved and sought Jewish community. Their determination and dedication attracted others to join TBS.

In the 1990s, our Hebrew School was growing exponentially. Additional classrooms were needed. Viola Rosenberg pledged a substantial amount to the project. Led by Geerd Mattheus and Carl Kass, along with many volunteers helping with construction, raising and pledging additional funds, the school addition was dedicated in 2000.

In the mid 2010s, our sanctuary and social hall were showing signs of aging. Thanks to Flo and Andy Hannes, we now have a beautiful new sanctuary, accessible to all, as well as an updated social hall. But we do not forget our past. Many items remain as is. Our former member Debra Weber took the old Torah and amud coverings and crafted them together to design two beautiful wall hangings which now adorn our sanctuary walls. When URJ Kutz Camp closed, Wendy Cedar brought the Tree of Life to TBS. This was created by her stepfather Steve Cooper in honor of her mother Karen Cooper. Karen was also the first female board member of TBS, and Wendy the first Bat Mitzvah to read from the Torah. And now, that Tree of Life is a focal point in our social hall.

For the love of Temple Beth Shalom, we continue to move forward with energy and enthusiasm, along with our dedication to teaching our children, as well as our vision for the ongoing growth of a Jewish community. Thank you to all who provide their time, resources, hard work, and extra shekels.

Thank you to Rabbi Rebecca Shinder for providing us with love, leadership, and spiritual guidance for so many years.

Board of Education Message

Just as religious schools throughout the world have had to rethink what is possible to achieve their goals, so too has TBS reimagined how we provide a vibrant, relevant and meaningful Jewish education. As ever, our focus is to teach our children the fundamentals of Judaism – and underpinning it all, our educators spark that Jewish spirit – through song, dance, arts, crafts, stories and history. At TBS, our children learn how to do, think, feel and be Jewish.

We at TBS offer radical continuity amidst the radical change that resulted from Covid. Among our reforms you'll find our enhanced Thursday Zoom Hebrew School with elements of our previous Religious School curriculum. This includes opening a NEW Zoom classroom for children in grades K-2.

For a multi-age experience, we've designed another radical educational shift. Our TBS community now leans in to a community based learning experience called YACHAD, the Hebrew word for together. These monthly sessions are designed for our TBS family of families to make memories and to make a difference. For the past seventy-five years, we have worked to fulfill a promise to our community: to help shape the young minds of our children toward a Jewish identity.

We provide experienced and knowledgeable teachers who truly care about their students. Small classes enable each child to be known as an individual, using interesting and motivating texts and materials. School includes hands-on projects, Mitzvah Days and other acts of Tzedakah, class Shabbats and unique Shabbat services. There are frequent opportunities to meet with other Jewish students, and visit places relevant to our Jewish culture and history through group activities.

Providing the children of Temple Beth Shalom with an education was one of the first priorities of the Hebrew Community Center when it was organized in 1947. As our student population grew, the need for more space became evident to all. Through the generosity of William and Viola Rosenberg and our temple members a school wing was dedicated in 2000.

We take pride in our students and we thank God, our parents and our community for providing us with such a treasure of outstanding young people. We can only pray that Temple Beth Shalom continues to grow and prosper. We dedicate ourselves to assisting in this majestic endeavor.

Memories From A Founding Family Member

The Werner Family has extremely strong ties to Temple Beth Shalom for if it wasn't for TBS all of our lives would have turned out much differently. I am happy to share my memories. Here is our story....

After a long week at school, every Friday mom prepared a wonderful Shabbos meal, lit Shabbos candles and benched licht. Dad put his yarmulke on, poured the Manischewicz wine into his silver kiddush cup, recited kiddush, said the hamotzi, we ate and we got into the Shabbos mobile and drove to shul located at 13 Roosevelt Ave. in Florida NY. My mother's father, Charles named our car, the Shabbos mobile as the temple was an almost 2 mile walk from our home on the outskirts of town. Mom was born in Manhattan and raised Orthodox in Boro Park. She



pushed my brother in his stroller to and from shul on a dark country road every Friday night. So my Grandfather suggested to take the Shabbos mobile. He told mom if you don't feel safe walking in the dark with young children, G-d will understand. So we took the Shabbos mobile safely to shul every Friday night.

Temple Beth Shalom is where I learned about our vast Jewish history, to sing the beautiful prayers, read and write Hebrew and most importantly where I connected with G-d. I am indebted to Temple Beth Shalom for giving me a wonderful Jewish education, a safe place to worship and meet many other Jewish families and childhood friends.

My brother attended Hebrew school in 1953 and in 1960 at the age of 13, Robert became a Bar Mitzvah. I was 3 years old and remember how proud I felt watching my big brother become a Bar Mitzvah as was my brother Jerrold who followed in 1967.

In 1963, at the age of 6, I attended Hebrew school every Tuesday and Thursday afternoons and Sunday school on Sunday mornings at TBS. Rabbi Leopold Kagan called my mom and said, "She can sing she should be Bat Mitzvah'ed!" And so my studies began and in 1969 at the age of 12, I was the first girl to be Bat Mitzvah'ed at Temple Beth Shalom. I remember standing on the bema in front of the congregation looking at so many familiar faces singing every prayer as I was taught, recited my Haftorah, proudly leading the Friday night service.

This was the beginning of my Jewish experience and by far not the end. At the age of 18, I also had the privilege of teaching Sunday school for a year while attending my first year of college.

My mother, Deborah Finkelstein Werner volunteered to be the first Hebrew school teacher. She taught her students at the Florida Firehouse in the village until the temple was built.

Memories continued

My father, Nathan Werner was determined to build a temple or Jewish community center as my mother felt there was no Yiddish-keit in Florida NY and wanted to move back to Brooklyn. On the corner of Main Street at the red light my dad saw Irving "Denny" Denenberg, Myron Cohen and Ben Chiron and walked over to them to tell them of his plan to build a Jewish Community Center or a shul and they thought it was a great idea.

My father opened the telephone book searching for Jewish sounding names and hand wrote 100 postcards inviting the community to come to the Florida Firehouse to discuss the building of either a Jewish Community Center or a synagogue. Over 90 people both Jewish and non-Jewish attended the meeting showing great interest.

After that my dad went to land owners in town and was asked what the land was going to be used for who then said the land was not for sale. My father told his father that no one will sell their land to build a Temple. My grandfather, David Werner told him, "I own a piece of land about a mile out of town that I will donate and you can build the temple there." My father accepted his dad's offer and sought out an architect to plan the blueprints. My Uncle Morris excavated the land and TBS was built before my parents marriage on December 8, 1946.

The Board of Directors was formed and my father declined to be the President as he felt his family and business commitments would not allow him the time to take on this responsibility. Myron Cohen became the first sitting President.

As a child growing up in Florida New York, I looked forward to Friday night services at Temple Beth Shalom. There I met my childhood friends; Steven and David Cines (Robert and Elaine Cines sons), Rhonda and Steven Spindel (Bernie and Seena Spindel's children), Lori Denenberg (Denny and Ada Denenberg's daughter), Eddie Heller (Marty and Belle Heller's son), the Neustadts, the Sussweins, Howard Cohen (Sid and Ethel Cohen's son) and my parents' very close friends Helen and Jake Cohen.

We have celebrated so many family Simchas in the Temple's social hall and so enjoy meeting the new members when able to attend the wonderful holiday services at TBS.

My Grandfather David Werner also donated the land for Temple Beth Shalom's Cemetery on Spanktown Rd. in Florida where he and all of his children including my beloved father Nathan and Uncle Morris Werner are buried. I am certain they are beaming proudly from above on the 75th year of our Jewish legacy at Temple Beth Shalom.

Lastly, I would like to express my immense appreciation for all the wonderful leadership that Rabbi Rebecca Shinder and her family do at TBS and our family of invaluable members including our sitting Co-Presidents Catherine Greenblatt and Wendy Cedar as well as all that Sharon Ball, Gail Conklin, Iris Barlet do all year long and to Sharon Halper for the writing of the book "The Temple That Was Built On Love," my parents' love story.

More Memories

Shirley and Seymour Gordon were long-time members of TBS. Seymour passed away in July of 2011 at the age of 87 and Shirley moved closer to her children.

- Shirley recalled the generosity of the Florida Fire Dept. for letting us use the 2nd floor of the firehouse for Hebrew school. We had no building then.
- She and Seymour moved to the area in 1950. Lou Gordon of Florida Hardware, had set up the school and Shirley volunteered to teach.
- . Herman Rudnick, Meyer Entin, and Lou Gordon were determined to have a building and were instrumental in the construction.
- . Shirley recalled how active Sisterhood was in fundraising, bazaars, etc. for the building.
- . Seymour Gordon acted as cantor for the High Holy Day services during the tenure of several Rabbis.
- Shirley felt that it was so fortuitous that the previously conservative temple became a Reform Temple. It made sense to be part of the international Kutz camp, since we were in the town of Warwick.

Michael Melasky, Past President and Hebrew Teacher Extraordinaire Back in the early 1980s, on a very, very cold and blizzard-like Saturday evening in February, I drove from Caryl's parents house on Long Island to be witness to a regional temple youth event held at TBS. I was a young boychik at the time and this was something I did for my part-time work as Youth Advisor to Central NY Federation of Temple Youths – CNFTY. I'd expected the event to be poorly attended, given the weather, which was absolutely miserable. I could not have been more mistaken.

This was the very first time I entered Temple Beth Shalom. What I saw was unbelievable. The enormous energy, enthusiasm and power of well over 250 youth group members, staff, and parents shoehorned into the social hall was a vision which still remains vivid in my mind all these years later.

I recall the spirit and vitality that was generated, as well as a love for song, dance, prayer, and a bit of teenage mischievous behavior. What's even more intoxicating was that TBS's very own youth group was voted CNYFTY's Youth Group of the Year, with some of our current members' children in leadership positions. Mind you, TBS had just a handful of TYG members and were up against congregations literally10x the size; but clearly not in spirit. This was my initial introduction to TBS - what a wonderful memory; and I don't even remember driving in the storm (well over 200 miles) with only rear wheel drive and of course no cell phone.






July 1947: a small group of local Jews, in Florida, NY, vote to build a synagogue -Temple Beth Shalom.




