The Purim Casting Call

In order to understand the creation and meaning of The Book of Esther and Purim, I'd like for you to imagine the leading characters as follows: For Esther, think of Marilyn Monroe, or Madonna, or Lady GaGa. Mordecai is Paul Newman, as a senior citizen. Haman is Captain Hook, and the Sons of Haman are the Keystone Cops! If Mel Brooks had been given a Jewish education, and knew the true meaning of the holiday, he surely would have made a film, "Purim, the Movie." As surely the Marx brothers might have done, in their time, calling their opus, simply, "Humantschen."

The original Book of Esther, one of the five scrolls (megillot) in the Bible was originally written as a ribald comedy around 200-250 BCE, not a history book written circa 1,000 BCE in Persia, where the story is set. I know that it is shocking for some to discover that in Persia, where records were meticulously kept, there was no historic Haman, nor Achashverus. Sorry, there was no Mordecai, and the name "Esther," is a word play on the fertility goddess, Astarte, (same root word in Hebrew as Esther) small statuettes of whom were kept in households throughout the ancient near east. In the time that the story was written and reproduced by scribes on scrolls, everyone got the joke.

It's as if Marylyn Monroe was the heroine who saved the Jewish people from extinction. That's what the author of the "Book of Esther," was trying to do with Haman, because in the year 250 BCE, there had been many, and would be many who tried to annihilate the Israelites. The writer was mocking them, and the readers of, and the listeners to, understood this and laughed. The earliest scrolls containing the story were carbon dated to this period, as was the philology of the Hebrew words and grammar therein.

Purim occurs at a time of the year, late January to February, when many ancient cultures observed a bacchanalia festival against the darkness and bleakness of the winter. Each leads in measured time to a Spring festival, as in Purim to Passover, or later, mardi gras to Easter. They were based on earlier pagan observances that were ultimately given religious grounding.

So, in earlier times, Purim was an observance that said, for one day, "don't sweat it." Don't take the world seriously. Later Purim was a time to see the world upside down. Medieval Purim Schpiels portrayed the Rabbi as jester, and the jester as rabbi. Everything was mocked. The King was a fool and a drunk, the tyrant overthrown. the sex goddess saves the People, the Jew saves the life of the King. And let's tell the story in noise, song, drunkenness, and joy.

Around the first century CE, long after the time of the Greek (Hellenistic) influence on Judaism, such ribald tales were just entertainment. At a time when heroes were needed to combat (physically and emotionally) the Roman oppressors, the early rabbis began to see the opportunity to teach about Jewish heroism in The Book of Esther. Purim, as we know it, had not yet evolved, but the scholars who met at the town of Yavneh to decide what books would be included or excluded in Tanach (The Hebrew Bible) decided to include the story of Esther, which was then being read with "new eyes." It was a perfect secret code to foster revolution against Rome.



Hundreds of synagogues across the continent will take part in an historic national Jewish event to celebrate what unifies all Jews — Shabbat! Everyone is invited... singles, couples, families — all ages. That's the magic of Shabbat Across America. By participating in this continent-

wide event, you will not only have the opportunity to experience Shabbat, but you will be sharing your experience with tens of thousands of Jews across North America.

And this year Temple Beth Shalom is also preparing for Purim with gifts and delicious hamantashen for all who come. Wear a silly or your favorite hat. Join us for dinner at 5:30 and stay for Erev Shabbat at 7. We'll have a brief musical service led by Rabbi Rebecca Shinder and featuring our in-house choir, Haverim B'shirim.

Rabbi Shinder, continued

The Purim festival that grew over the next centuries influenced celebrations in other cultures, predominately, Mardi Gras. The jester and joking and myrrh continued to play a larger part, as did Mordecai and Esther as Hero and savior. Even in this outrageous story, even in inebriation, even in ribald rivalry, the story gave hope, especially to children.

Like much in Judaism, Purim can be understood on many levels. Children in Religious School are encouraged to be like Mordecai and Esther. The sex trade way in which the Queen was chosen is ignored by everyone by an unspoken code. It provides a day of fun and release, and implicitly says, God doesn't wasn't you to sweat it, or take yourself so seriously today. "Give yourself a break, today. "Though curiously, The Book of Esther is the only book of the Bible where God's name isn't mentioned (is that a clue to its origin?). Marilyn Monroe, Paul Newman, Captain Hook, and a bit of a "nudge-nudge wink-wink" for our kids is how we retell this story in modern times. Now that we've considered the origin of Purim, let's talk about how we at TBS will celebrate it this year.

Our in person Shabbat services commence on Friday, March 3rd. Please join us for a meal at 5:30PM for both our Religious School AND Shabbat Across America - an opportunity to open our home to guests. Our 7PM service will set the tone for Purim and will feature our adult choir, Chaverim B'Shirim. You are encouraged to wear a silly or your favorite hat. Congregants will receive their Mishloach Manot treats, as well. Our Religious School students will be featured in a Purim Schpiel, the historic telling of the story in outrage and song, at the All-County Religious School program at the Monroe Temple on Sunday March 5th, 10AM - 1PM. A carnival will follow the Schpiel and students are encouraged to wear costumes. Participation in this event is expected, as well as the March 19th Mitzvah Day at TBS 10M-noon. We will be learning about both ethical and religious mitzvot and introducing a Hebrew Through Movement lesson to help our kids prepare for Passover.

It's been far too long since we joined in the merry making that Purim has to offer. Join us, bring a friend, wear a hat, and (this one shouldn't be too hard) have a humantashen with an old or new temple friend!!

Finally, are you/were you a scout or scout leader? On Friday, March 31st troops from Florida, Goshen and Monroe will join us at 6:30PM for an introduction to Judaism in general, and an orientation to our TBS sanctuary in specific. We'll then proceed with our 7PM service. Please help me to be a gracious host, and if you have a uniform - wear it!!


