From the Desk of Rabbi Rebecca P. Shinder

In the revival of the Broadway musical Camelot, Queen Gwenivere, played by Philippa Soo cheerily proclaims to the inhabitants of her kingdom, "It's May, It's May!" She encourages her subjects to dance and revel in a colorful celebration of Spring. I am happy to proclaim that our own version of a congregational Camelot, has a great deal to celebrate this May, as well.

We will begin May 5th at he 7PM Shabbat service with elements led by students in our first level of Hebrew class. We chose to pick Hebrew colors to name our classes this year. Thus, our Adom class, under the leadership of their teacher, Scott Dunn, will start the month off with a terrific, musical service and a fun oneg to follow.

The next element that will take place on at TBS on Sunday, May 7th at 9:30AM, brings me to another one of Philippa Soo's professional gigs - the mega-hit, Hamilton. This will be our final Religious School/Sunday School/Yachad of the year. No matter what you call it, this will conclude our learning and continue the partnership already begun with the Torah School of The Monroe Temple of Liberal Judaism. We will begin at our new time of 9:30 am in our sanctuary. I implore students and their parents and/or grandparents to be, "in the room where it happens." That is to say, you must come to TBS to experience this partnership, meet new kids and teachers, and hold the Torah as you transition to your new grade level. After the opening ceremony in the sanctuary at 9:30AM, students will go to classrooms for a lesson and the parents will stay in the sanctuary to receive details of what next year's program will look like. Among the headlines, we will discuss how we will return to weekly school on Sundays AND a once a month Chavaya, the Hebrew word for experience. These events will range from field trips to mitzvah outings to the bringing in of Israeli artists. After the parent meeting and classroom learning (yippie, our rooms have been empty for almost 3 years), we will go outside for schmoozing and a BBQ.

May 7th will be another day we invite our newly formed Playgroup for young preschool aged children. Our playroom will be open at 10AM and families will then join us for our BBQ.

On Friday, May 12th at our 7PM service, we will continue the theme of L'Dor Vador as we have baby namings for three girls. They will all receive their Hebrew names, be blessed and welcomed into the Covenant of Abraham and Sarah, and we invite you to be present to welcome them and their parents into our Temple Beth Shalom family of families.

May also begins our Spring B'nei Mitzvah season. We invite you to share in these Shabbat morning services at 10AM. If you, and especially your children, have never attended a TBS Bar or Bat Mitzvah, you simply must attend as many of these three services as you can. In addition to leading the Shabbat morning service, chanting Torah and Haftorah, and delivering a speech, our students also help to led the Friday night service before their big day. 

CO~PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

After hearing a certain parasha (a few times) with God's directives to Moses about building a place (the "mishkan") where God can hang out with the Israelites as they journeyed through the desert, I wanted to learn more. So I found some commentary on it at: MyJewishLearning.com/article/parashat-terumah-hidden-gifts. Thank you, internet, and thank you Rabbi Shinder, whose live commentary over the past few years is what stimulated me to want to learn more!





Yet, in the 21st century, we're finding that people are less likely to feel compelled to dwell together in a synagogue. Perhaps they'll want to dwell together with other Jews, but not necessarily in a synagogue. That's where more interpretation of this parasha has opened my eyes. God says to Moses, "Tell the Israelite people to bring me gifts; you shall accept gifts for me from every person whose heart so moves them." Traditionally, we have interpreted this as "everyone should give as much money as they feel is appropriate." Of course, to maintain the physical space of our "mishkan", there is value to that! However, Rabbi Nicole Auerbach, the author of the aforementioned commentary also suggests this:

A few verses after identifying the acceptable material for the construction of the mishkan, God says that the ark that will hold the stone tablets containing God's covenant with the people should be topped by two gold-winged figures, the cherubim. The cherubim are to "confront one another" *ish el achiv*, God says, literally like a man to his brother. And it is between these two faces that God promises to make God's presence known. How fitting that at the heart of this communal building project, which will take the gifts of everyone's hearts, God will appear between two precious faces placed across from one another as though in conversation.

To identify our most precious, hidden gifts we need to spend some time face to face with our fellow community builders, to listen deeply and with curiosity, open to the possibility we will find a unicorn hiding in the pocket of the person across from us. And when we find one, to reflect back what we see. Because nothing feels better than someone else pointing out a gift that you didn't know you had.

This, ultimately, is the recipe for building a community, to see one another and allow ourselves to be seen. In this way we can help one another find the hidden gifts we each hold, and then share them with open and generous hearts, allowing God's presence to shine through and fill the space between us.

In a world in which people spend less time face-to-face, and so many of us have less desire to dwell together in a synagogue, this interpretation really speaks to me. Perhaps, if we remember that community is, by this definition, people coming together with "two precious faces placed across from one another... in conversation", listening "deeply and with curiosity" with the goal of identifying each other's hidden gifts, then our community will continue to grow and stay strong.

Please be sure to mark your calendars for our congregational meeting, in-person or via Zoom, on 5/11 in the evening at TBS. We'll have food, conversation, and some very important discussions about the very future of our community.

Zoom Hebrew School: 5/4, 5/11 End of year BBO 5/7



From Rabbi Rebecca Shinder:

- ◆ Students in our Adom class will be featured in our May 5th service. Whereas I encourage Shabbat attendance throughout the year, this will be a special Shabbat evening. If you have not brought your kids to temple in a long time for services, I suggest that you make every effort to do so on 5/5 not only for the practical use of Hebrew but also for the important socialization and Jewish community.
- Our final Religious School/Yachad is Sunday, May 7th, with students and teachers from The Monroe Temple. We are partnering our schools and there will be simultaneous classroom learning AND a parent meeting to learn more about how this partnership will work. This day is not optional. We will have a brief year-end ceremony in the sanctuary and finish the day with field games and a BBQ.
- ♦ The final day of Hebrew School is May 11th. There are only 2 Hebrew School sessions left this year. I encourage you to do your best to have your kids maximize this time with not only stellar attendance but also with the best possible Zoom etiquette they can muster. Please check in with them to make sure they are ready to go with the opening assembly at 4:30pm. Our bit.ly/tbsschool opens at 4:15 for them to get settled, say hello. We begin teaching when "the school bell" chimes. The kids have been fabulous this year and our teachers are first-rate.
- ◆ The goal of our school is to educate Jewish children so that they have the tools necessary to become educated Jewish adults. A highlight of that journey takes place when a child is called to Torah as a Bar or Bat Mitzvah. We encourage you and your children to attend the 10 am B'nei Mitzvah ceremonies of: Hilary Kleinman on 5/20, Steven Weinberg on 6-10 and Jason Henze on 6/24.

We are at a period of transition for our school, the more you and your family put in, I assure you, the more your children will get out.


